

LETTER FROM OUR CEO AND BOARD CHAIR

This has been a year of tremendous growth and increased service to thousands of people across all our programs. Our Center for New Americans welcomed refugees from all over the world, including people who fled Afghanistan and Ukraine and have been actively working to ensure their immigration status, helping them find affordable, safe housing, and jobs to support their families as they start their lives over in the U.S. Our newly created Center for Healthy Aging continues to expand, with programs to address the needs of isolated elders through direct service, technology, and group supports. In our Center for Dialogue & Action, the dialogues among our city and suburban schools are growing by leaps and bounds, and the Community-Police Dialogues are well underway throughout the city. A new Food Justice Initiative is addressing the food inequities across our community.

As stewards of our headquarters at 1010 James Street, we are making important capital improvements. We are about to commence our environmentally-sound Save The Rain parking lot project, install an EV station, and beautify the property. With our burgeoning programs, we are assuming more space across the whole building, while still providing space for other non-profit tenants. This includes a suite that National Grid helped us renovate for our expanded work to address the long-term needs of refugees, including citizenship and trauma-informed practices.

Our work to endow the agency for the future continues, with much success. Establishing our fund at the Central New York Community Foundation has raised our profile among the area's donors. Several significant gifts have been secured that will provide program support for years to come.

Our relationships with our faith partners and community connections continue to sustain and enrich our work. We would not be able to do all we do without the network of friends and partners at our side. In so many ways, InterFaith Works has matured into an anchor service and justice agency – something that our founders would be very proud to know. Thank you to all who have helped us get to this point! Stay tuned for what happens next!





A STORY OF SURVIVAL

Bakary, Salma, Zohour, and Zuhal Adam are survivors. This courageous family survived a war in Sudan and Bakary's unexpected and sudden kidney failure. The Adam family was more than willing to share their story with InterFaith Works because they are uncertain what their future would have been like without the agency. Walking into their home, there is a palpable sense of warmth and joy. Bakary and his family take pride in their new home. It is meticulously tidy and ornately decorated in silver and gold fabrics. Two little girls, Zohour age 7, and Zuhal age 4, run and play in the house, communicating with their parents in Arabic.

The Adams fled Sudan to escape the dangers of war. They spent about five years in Jordan to apply to immigrate to the U.S. They tried to live life as normally as possible. Bakary started working to provide for his family while they anxiously waited. Then, suddenly, their lives were forever changed for the second time. Bakary fainted at work and was rushed to the hospital. He found out he was in the late stages of kidney failure. For the next two years, he went to multiple dialysis appointments each week. Still, he and his family were determined to make the arduous journey to a better life that awaited them in Syracuse. When they arrived in June 2019 InterFaith Works was there to greet them. Upon their arrival at the airport, the staff from InterFaith Works took Bakary straight to the hospital. His condition had only worsened, and he was in dire need of a transplant. Staff members also took him to his dialysis treatments three times a week and coordinated all his other appointments.

Before he could even be considered for a transplant, he needed appointments with a dentist, dermatologist, social worker, nutritionist, and cardiologist.

Eventually, the dream of receiving a transplant was realized and the Adam family gained a new lease on life. They still face challenges. Bakary is still in recovery and is not cleared for full-time work while attending multiple mandatory doctors' appointments and testing. Instead, Bakary and Salma both have part-time jobs to make ends meet. Salma has been the rock of their family through it all. She worked with InterFaith Works to get her driver's license and was able to purchase a car. Providing transportation for her family has made their lives significantly better. Now, the Adams pay it forward and do what they can to help others in a similar situation. They refer people to InterFaith Works and help them navigate Syracuse as much as they can.

Bakary explains why they choose to help other New Americans, "Coming here alone can be difficult, so if you can find someone to help and guide you it is easier, especially when you don't speak the language." An InterFaith Works' Intensive Case Worker Jihad Al Jiboury has been involved in every aspect of the family's journey and is still in contact with them today. Having someone to guide them, and who spoke their language, helped them to build their first relationship in their new home. Salma considers Jihad to be a part of their family now. "She is like my sister", Salma emphatically says.



EVER THE EDUCATOR

Leandra Reddy, a devoted wife, and mother of four, does not seem to mind that she lives in a building predominately occupied by college students. Most of her neighbors are the same age as her two oldest children, ages 20 and 19, who also study at a local college. Reddy and her family of six gladly call this colorful, eclectic, but quiet building in Syracuse home.

Originally from Africa, the family filed for asylum in 2021. Leandra's husband started to research immigration resources. He contacted InterFaith Works to aid his wife in applying for work authorization. They attribute the success of relocating to Syracuse to the unwavering assistance and reassurance of InterFaith Works' staff. As a software developer, Reddy's husband's career in their new country was already solidified. Working in technology had always allowed him the freedom to transcend location and, fortunately, he already had clients and associates in New York.

Unlike her husband, Leandra's extensive work and education as a teacher for over a decade was not transferable from one country to another.

She has all the qualifications teachers are expected to have. Her educational background includes a bachelor's degree in early childhood education. She taught for several educational institutions and most recently owned and operated a preschool before migrating. Although she plans to get a New York State teaching certificate, the arduous process could take a while. In the meantime, through InterFaith Works' Professional Pathways Program, she received an offer as a Teaching Assistant Substitute. Job coaches at InterFaith Works assisted in each step of Leandra's hiring process. Reddy is beginning a new life chapter and remains optimistic and even excited about the future. She shared why she is adamant about continuing her work in education: "I would like to focus on me because I have given to my kids. They were homeschooled, so now it is time for me to give back to other kids."

In 2022, InterFaith Works placed 29 highly skilled immigrants in new jobs through the Professional Pathways Program, which is organized to assist people with professional credentials from their home country to pursue work and careers in their professional fields in our community. This includes doctors, nurses, engineers, teachers, and architects.



DIALOGUE IN ACTION

Every year, the El-Hindi Center for Dialogue & Action confronts the ongoing segregation of Central New York Schools through Racial Equity Dialogues. One of CDA's numerous action-based programs includes the School Exchange, which pairs a Syracuse City School District school with a rural or suburban school. The teens from one school spend time learning about the academic, extracurricular, and social environments at their partner school. Teens from each school are trained as facilitators and lead the dialogues for their peers.

Three students from three vastly different schools met at InterFaith Works to share their transformative experiences: Alaa Laila graduated this year from PSLA at Fowler, a city school, and has been a part of the School Exchange dialogues for three years as a facilitator. Emeka Okereke is a rising senior at Jamesville-DeWitt High School, a suburban school, and has been a part of the intraschool dialogue for two years as a participant and facilitator. Thomas Chatfield just graduated from Tully High School, a rural school, and has been involved with school exchanges for two years as a participant and facilitator. The three students acknowledged that dialogues gave them the opportunity to make connections with people they assumed they had nothing in common with. Emeka recalls how these difficult conversations changed his mind: "I made friends with people I wouldn't have been friends with before. I met people that, at first, I thought I wouldn't relate to, but I found ways that I related to them."

These three teens observed a shift in the behavior and social interactions of their peers. The dialogues taught them how to resolve conflicts on a day-to-day basis at school. Alaa explained how she and her peers became better at resolving their internal and external conflicts: "Let's be honest. Before the dialogue, my classmates and I all had assumptions about kids that were coming in. Then we realized, no that's not true! We decided to start having these conversations more often with each other and not just in a dialogue setting. We started to realize that we are all connected. Last year a lot of us hated our school, especially when we were compared to a predominantly white school. They had more resources, and we hated our school. This year when we partnered with a different school, even though they still had more resources, we learned to appreciate our school, especially the culture. We are glad to be at PSLA, and to see that growth made me happy. We appreciate our differences."

Thomas recalls gaining a new perspective on people who attend a school in the Syracuse City School District, a school much different from his rural school in Tully, NY. "Tully was partnered with ITC, I got new perspectives on how people in Syracuse live. You don't think going into it you will have any similarities with kids from another type of school but once you talk to people you see how similar we all are."

There is still work to be done to eradicate the various forms of hatred. With the help of InterFaith Works, these three young people and hundreds of others who participated in dialogues, are excited about carrying the torch into their future, shining a light of understanding on others. They all unanimously and passionately agree that dialogues should keep giving people of all ages a way in which to be seen, heard, and, most importantly, understood.







BEYOND COMPANIONSHIP

Caring for elderly parents can be more demanding and difficult than some people anticipate. Annette Adams-Brown never intended to move in with her parents, until she stayed with them one night and realized serious intervention was needed. She recalled what she was shocked to find: "I have never seen a six-pack of NyQuil. I asked Daddy what are y'all doing with a six-pack of NyQuil? He said, 'Me and your momma take a shot of NyQuil every night and sleep like babies!' That was one of many things that made me realize I needed to intervene."

Although she can find humor in it now, Annette was deeply concerned about her parent's health and wellbeing. She noticed that their food was incredibly salty. They became the victims of vicious phone scams. Her mother was increasingly forgetful and complained of extreme headaches. Annette sought further testing for her mother's head pain. Unfortunately, she was diagnosed with a serious brain bleed. Unbeknownst to Annette, her mother had severely injured her head days before while retrieving Christmas decorations. Adams-Brown started checking in on her parents even more.

Her dad began to deteriorate physically as well. When he died in 2016, she and her mother moved into a 55+ living facility. Annette began to know her mother in a different way than she knew her before. Annette's mother, Bertha Ann, and her husband moved to Syracuse decades ago in search of a better life, and that is what they found. A gallery wall of past pictures in her living room tells the story of a life that has been full. Bertha Ann was highly educated and committed to her roles as wife and mother. Throughout her life, she pursued diverse career paths, was a singer, and was a board member for many organizations.

Now it is Annette's turn to care for her mother, as her mother has cared for many over the years. Annette reached out to InterFaith Works to inquire about the Senior Companion Program. When asked what type of companion she wanted for her mother, Annette gave an honest answer but thought it might be farfetched, "I would love an African American woman from the South who is 80 and up!" Simultaneously, Frances Williams was becoming a Senior Companion Volunteer and she fit Annette's description perfectly.

Frances is from Mississippi, and she has been in Syracuse since she was 19 years old. Before retirement, she worked as a home health aide. After 20-plus years as a volunteer, Frances says she volunteers to help, but her involvement is also personal: "I love to talk to people, and I have to get out of the house! I would be nuts if I stayed at home." Frances visits four times a week or more, and she considers herself family. Although they are close in age, Frances teases, "We are more like mother and daughter." Adams does not mind saying, "That's my main little girl!" Bertha Ann can relate to Frances' southern heritage, as she grew up in Virginia. The pair have a lot in common, passing the days with conversations about how things used to be. Despite difficulties that inevitably come with a brain injury, Bertha Ann seems happy. Annette and Frances will continue to do everything they can to make sure she stays that way.





A LEGACY OF GRATITUDE

Rabbi Daniel Jezer has been an integral part of InterFaith Works over the years. He was a part of the agency back when it was known as The Syracuse Area Interreligious Council. He was quickly recognized for his tenacity when standing up to inevitable, and often difficult, challenges. As a result, he served as Vice President and became the President of the Board of Directors. He also served as Convenor of the Round Table of Faith Leaders. During that time, he was involved in finding grants to start what would eventually become the Center for Dialogue & Action, a cause still near to his heart. Rabbi Jezer is one of the founding members of the local Labor-Religion Coalition and a past president of the Onondaga Pastoral Counseling Center. For 35 years he has been on the faculty of LeMoyne College and was Adjunct Union President at the college for eight years. His wife, Dr. Rhea Jezer, has her own history with the agency, having also served as a Board member. Dr. Rhea Jezer is a noted musician, environmental educator, policy advisor, and consultant. She has even run for Congress. Dr. Rhea Jezer is also the Founder and Chair of the award-winning Symposium on Energy in the 21st Century and is President of the non-profit Energy21.

The Jezers met each other while traveling to Israel and have continued to explore the world together. Their world travel is evident all around their everchanging lake house, boasting Chinese sculptures modeled after the Terracotta Army, ceramic Tagine pots from Morocco, and sliding shoji doors from Japan. While traveling, the Jezers have picked up more than keepsakes and memories. They've set out on many journeys aimed at aiding people across the globe. Rabbi Jezer shared his perspective on how traveling has influenced his outlook on life: "You have certain assumptions just by living in the U.S. like how things work, how people think, and their priorities. When you travel you see there are very different perspectives from your own."

New and different perspectives left a strong impression on the Jezers. The couple frequently makes generous donations to numerous organizations every year, including InterFaith Works. When asked why they chose a philanthropic lifestyle, donating much of their time and resources, Rabbi Jezer said, "We are put on earth to help improve the world, and that is our obligation." Dr. Jezer's answer demonstrated her selflessness, "You can't take it with you. And I personally think that after life what's left are the memories that people have of you." Rabbi Jezer continued, "Rhea has been president of numerous organizations and gives an inordinate amount of time. I too have been president of numerous organizations. We are put on earth to help others. And that is our obligation to work to better the world."

Having traveled extensively and engaged in philanthropic work for years, they now see themselves through clearer eyes. They consider themselves as peers to all, confident in their understanding of the complexities of the world and their place in it. The idea of a shared humanity makes it easy for them to participate in work that they consider crucial. This sense of duty encourages them to spread the word. Dr. Jezer recollects encouraging her friend in Colorado to donate to InterFaith Works. "I told a friend to donate to the agency because he cares about immigration and social causes. I was so proud to see his name on the list of donors, and I still see him there." Upon careful consideration and reflection on their lives, the Jezers aspire for their legacy to embody gratitude and a commitment to service. Rabbi Jezer believes everything he, his wife, and all of us do is bigger than ourselves: "The effect of what you have done in this world is your legacy. Your legacy is the sum of the good and bad you have done in the world. Since the entire world is connected, everything I do affects everyone in the world, and it affects all future generations."




